Amongst them Nezami Ganjei has openly discussed the inner challenges in his popular poem:

- 2. **The Cost of Spiritual Wars:** As E. Iqbal Lahori's poetry suggests, the internal spiritual struggle is a path to self-purification and enlightenment. In contrast, spiritual governments often externalize these conflicts, leading to prolonged and costly external

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confrontations. The Iranian regime's current policies may thus be seen as a manifestation of internal spiritual struggles projected onto the geopolitical stage.
