Companies and Universities Supporting the Act of Genocide in Gaza Through Financial Support or Public Statements: A Media Analysis

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Abstract

Following the Hamas attacks on Israel on October 7, 2023, multiple companies, individuals, and universities voiced their support for Israel, condemning the act of terrorism and extending humanitarian aid. This article analyzes the response of various entities, examining their public statements, donations, and support initiatives for Israel, especially in the context of the ongoing legal battle brought before the International Court of Justice (ICJ). South Africa v. Israel, a case filed on December 29, 2023, accuses Israel of violations under the Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide due to its actions in Gaza during the Israel–Hamas war. The article explores the responses to these allegations and the broader political and ethical implications of support for Israel in a time of heightened scrutiny. Those voices mainly remained silent or provided further support for Israel against the convention of Genocide. This article raises concerns and awareness about the people and entities who are willingly complicit in the criminal acts against humanity.

Introduction

On October 7, 2023, Hamas launched a brutal and unprecedented attack on Israel, targeting civilians and military installations. The attacks have been widely condemned by numerous governments, international organizations, and institutions. However, the ensuing conflict, particularly the Israeli military response in Gaza, has led to a complex and controversial legal situation.

South Africa, on December 29, 2023, filed a case with the International Court of Justice (ICJ), accusing Israel of genocide in Gaza. The case highlights the broader debate over Israel's actions and the accusations of crimes against humanity. This legal proceeding, titled *South Africa v. Israel* (Document Number: 192-20240126-ORD-01-00-EN), pertains to the violations of the Genocide Convention, raising questions about Israel's military conduct and its impact on Palestinian civilians. As the case progresses, global support for Israel remains a topic of contention.

In this context, several companies, individuals, and universities have made their positions clear, either by condemning Hamas or by providing direct support to Israel. These entities, despite the ongoing ICJ case and the humanitarian crisis in Gaza, have expressed solidarity with Israel through statements, financial support, and organizational aid.

Corporate and Philanthropic Support for Israel

Major Companies Supporting Israel

In the aftermath of the Hamas attacks, several corporations made significant donations to Israel and related humanitarian efforts. These contributions not only reflect a commitment to humanitarian relief but also serve as a counter-narrative to the allegations surrounding the conflict. The following companies provided financial aid:

1. **Walmart**: Donated \$1M to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum to support Holocaust education and anti-antisemitism initiatives (Walmart, 2023).

- 2. **Jefferies**: Committed \$8.6M to humanitarian aid, including a matching donation campaign with Bloomberg and other partners (Jefferies, 2023).
- 3. **Google & Alphabet**: Pledged \$8M to nonprofits, with \$3M dedicated to local emergency response efforts and \$3M to Gazarelated aid (Google, 2023).
- 4. **The Walt Disney Company**: Contributed \$2M to Magen David Adom and other Israeli organizations, coupled with employee matching gift programs (Disney, 2023).
- 5. **Salesforce**: Donated \$3M to various Israeli and humanitarian organizations, including \$1M each to United Hatzalah and Save the Children (Salesforce, 2023).

These companies, despite facing the backdrop of geopolitical tension and legal scrutiny, have reinforced their positions through philanthropy and public statements condemning violence against civilians, irrespective of the perpetrator.

Individuals Supporting Israel

Several prominent business leaders have been vocal in condemning the Hamas attacks and supporting Israel during the ongoing crisis. Their statements often emphasize the importance of upholding human rights and condemning terrorism, we could not find further evidence or retracement from their initial statements after they provided initial support for Israel, additionally many of them provided further fundamental means which has legalized Israels genocidal acts in Gaza and the Lebanon:

- Ed Bastian, CEO of Delta Air Lines, condemned the attacks and supported U.S. repatriation efforts for affected citizens (Bastian, 2023).
- **Albert Bourla**, CEO of Pfizer, publicly denounced the violence and reiterated his commitment to healthcare and peace (Bourla, 2023).
- **Sundar Pichai**, CEO of Google, condemned the violence and pledged resources for relief efforts, expressing support for employees affected by the conflict (Pichai, 2023).
- **Jamie Dimon**, CEO of JPMorgan Chase, joined others in denouncing Hamas and reaffirmed his support for the safety of all individuals, especially those affected by terrorism (Dimon, 2023).

These leaders, many of whom manage global corporations, have utilized their platforms to advocate for peace and support humanitarian efforts, even amid the ongoing legal case that questions the actions of the Israeli government.

Academic Institutions and Their Responses

Universities Condemning Hamas and Supporting Israel

In addition to corporate and individual support, universities worldwide have played a role in shaping public discourse surrounding the Israel–Hamas conflict. Many academic institutions have issued statements condemning the actions of Hamas and expressing solidarity with Israel, though the legal and ethical complexities of the conflict are often acknowledged.

- 1. **Harvard University**: President Claudine Gay condemned the Hamas attacks, distancing the university from student organizations that supported the violence (Harvard University, 2023).
- 2. **University of California (UC)**: Regent Richard Sures condemned Hamas, calling for the university to retract any supportive statements made by its student groups (UC Regents, 2023).
- 3. **University of Oxford**: The leadership issued a statement condemning the Hamas attacks and reiterated its stance against antisemitism and violence (University of Oxford, 2023).
- 4. **Duke University**: President Price condemned the attacks and extended support to the university community affected by the violence (Duke University, 2023).
- 5. **University of Wuerzburg**: University leadership expressed solidarity with Israel and condemned the attacks, reaffirming the institution's commitment to peace (University of Wuerzburg, 2023).

However, the university sector has also faced controversy. In some cases, criticism has arisen regarding delayed or insufficient condemnations, especially from student bodies or faculty members with more sympathetic views towards Palestinian causes. These internal debates reflect broader societal divisions, with some questioning the Israeli government's actions in Gaza.

Legal Challenges and International Scrutiny

The ongoing case at the International Court of Justice (*South Africa v. Israel*) raises significant questions about international law, state sovereignty, and the prevention of genocide. South Africa's application to the ICJ calls for Israel to cease actions it believes are genocidal and violating the Genocide Convention. This case is particularly pertinent as the court deliberates on Israel's conduct during the Gaza conflict, which has led to widespread casualties and a deteriorating humanitarian situation.

Despite these legal proceedings, many entities, both private and public, have continued to support Israel. Their support is often framed as a moral stance against terrorism, in favor of the preservation of life and security for civilians in Israel. At the same time, these entities maintain their humanitarian efforts, recognizing the need for assistance to Palestinian civilians affected by the ongoing violence.

Conclusion

As the International case against *Israel* continues to unfold at the International Court of Justice, the global response to the Israel–Hamas conflict remains deeply divided. Companies, individuals, and universities that have supported Israel are doing so amid a complex legal and moral landscape, balancing their commitments to humanitarian aid, corporate responsibility, and the protection of human rights.

In an era where public opinion is increasingly shaped by international law, media coverage, and corporate interests, these entities must navigate the difficult terrain between supporting Israel's and addressing the broader humanitarian concerns raised by the ongoing conflict. As the ICJ case progresses, it is clear that the international community will continue to debate the legal and ethical dimensions of the Israel–Hamas war, with implications for both international diplomacy and corporate responsibility.
